Council Receives Report of Police

By opening a laundry, is changing the intended purpose. Council felt the by-law would apply in this case and Mr. Can should be notified.

The Planning Board recommended an exemption of a lot on Wellington St. from the zoning by-law. The property, owned by John Williamson, was purchased before the zoning by-law was passed. It is not the required size for building and is the only one in town so affected.

Council passed a motion recommending exemption of the lot as long as Mr. Williamson retains ownership. The mayor and seven opposed this motion.

Councillor Greer suggested that some work be done on the sidewalk immediately. Council agreed and the Road Committee was to hire extra men to start this work immediately.

Clerk McGeachie was instructed to write a letter informing Harry Gordon that he would be held responsible for the broken sidewalk on Willow St. just south of Hotchen's Bakery.

An agreement was shelved, from the Department of Highways, asking that the town pay 50 per cent of maintenance costs on the centre 33 feet of Main St. By a previous agreement the Department was responsible for 100 per cent of the centre 22 feet.

Letters from E. A. Doyle and Co., insurance adjusters, refused payment on all of the claims referred to them. The damage, resulted from the installation of sewerage Council felt it was the adjuster's duty to file the claims against the Spartan Contracting Co. rather than referring them to the town.

Council discussed the possibility of having an insurance broker make a survey of the town insurance and submit recommendations.
