Hydro wires are being transferred from the Mill St. poles to poles located behind front street buildings. Completion workmen have been working on this project and are almost ready to transfer the wires. It is expected there will be no interruption in street lighting during the transfer.

Completion of the sewerage disposal plant is expected in September and it is the final project in the installation of sewerage system in town. The complicated tanks have been built at the site on the third line east of town and there are only two tanks to be finished.

HIS COMBINE PAID FOR ITSELF WITH ONLY TWO MONTHS' WORK

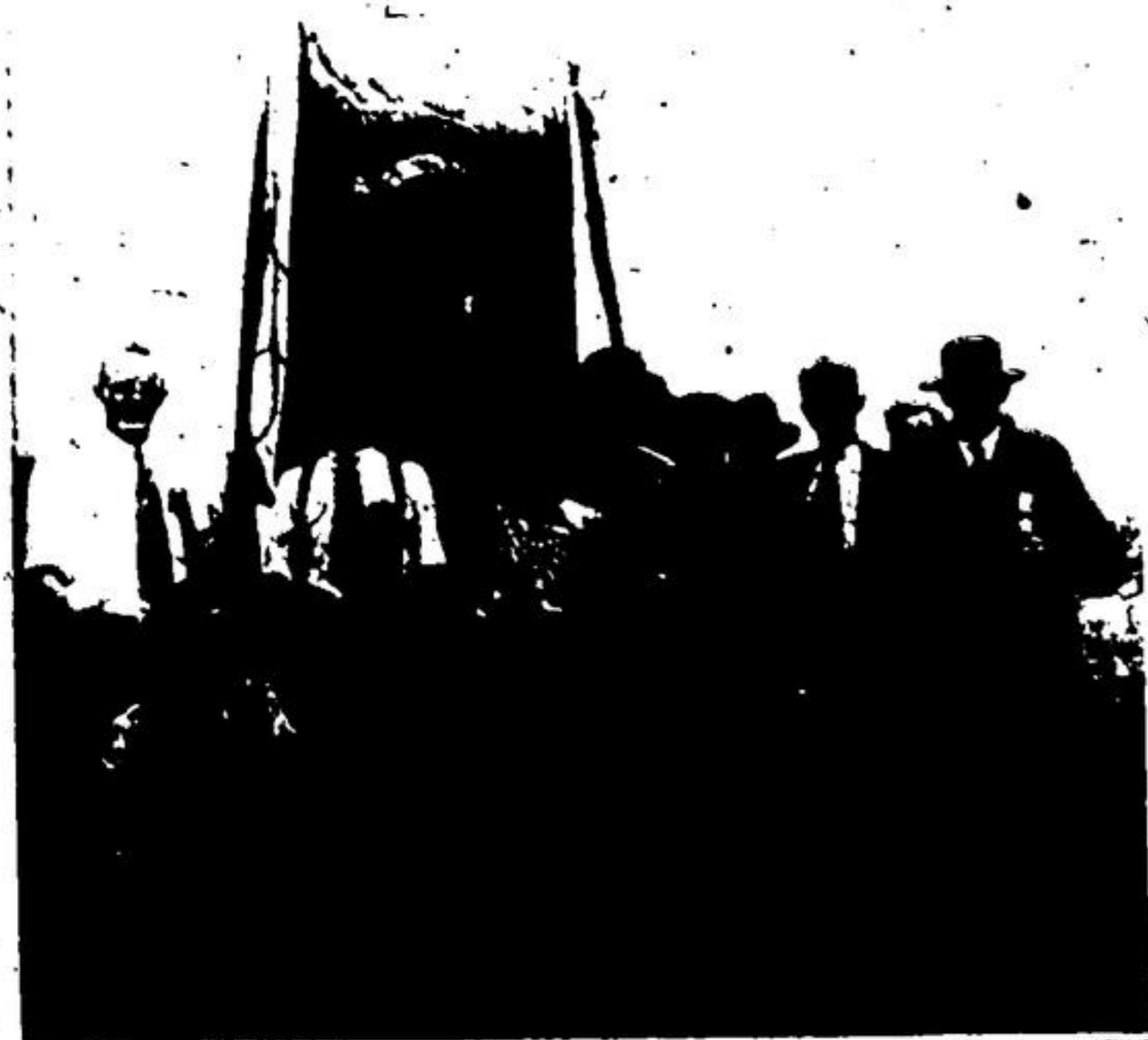
