INTS. STRIKE OIL AT CLARKSON DRILL THROUGH TO A 6-4 STAKE

A losing streak that has been plaguing the baseball Intermediates in their last four starts was ended at Clarkson last night as southpaw Mel Jordan hurled Acton to a 6-4 win over Clarkson Oilers.

Tonight (Thursday) Acton plays host to Clarkson in a game that was postponed earlier in the season and on Saturday Waterdown Merchants invade Acton in hopes of winning their third game from the locals.

As of now, postponed games have been so numerous the league secretary has been unable to compile a league standing that would be anywhere near accurate.

This was borne out last night at Clarkson when Acton had no difficulty in racking up a win, while with Oakville they have yet to come close.

The Oilers came back in the bottom half of the sixth to score as three runs, the result of three bobbles in the infield with Owen Masales committing two of them.

Jordan went the distance on the hill for Acton and gave up only seven hits. They were well spaced with no more than one in a single inning with the exception of the seventh when the Oilers managed two.

The Actons hammered eleven hits from two Clarkson pitchers, Owen Masales and Mel Jordan, each with three hits in four trips, led the assault.
