Why the Census? Changes in House

The Ninth Decennial Census of Canada in June this year is based on fundamental legal requirements dating from Confederation. Under Section 51 of the British North America Act, 1867, it was enacted that after the completion of the Census -An inquest is being held into of 1871, and of each subsequent ust I in Brookville Hall. The chief of these rules was that the Province of Quebec-should-have a fixed number of operation by next, year but the Members (65) and that the representation of other provinces in

> the same proportion to the population of the province as the number 65 bears to the population of the Province of Quebec. In 1946, Section 51 of the British North America Act was repealed and a new section substituted, as

follows:

"The number of members of the House of Commons shall be 255 and the representation of the Provinces therein shall forthwith, upon the coming into force of this Section. and thereafter on the completion of each decennial census, be readjusted according to the following rules- (a) subject as hereinatter. each of the provinces the number of Members computed by dividing the total population of the provinces by 254 and by dividing the population of each province by the quot ient so obtained

This new Section thus did away with the former provision in the Act by which the Province of Quebec was given a fixed representation for determining the quotient upon which representation in other provinces could be calculated. Accordingly, the membership of the House of Commons was increased that all our citizens observe it as from 245 to 255 (including one member from the Yukon).
