Council Will Not Take Bridge Blame

Esqueing Township Council will not be responsible for an accident that might result from the non-repair of the Hampshire culvert on lots 10 and 11, concession 3, members decided at their regular meeting on Tuesday, August 7. The road superintendent was instructed to write to the Canadian National Railway that the township would not be responsible for repairs of the culvert.

The road superintendent was instructed to call for tenders for a motor grader.

A by-law was passed extending the time for returning the 1952 assessment roll from October 1 to November 30, 1951.

Interest accrued from the railway bonus fund will be distributed among the different school sections in the township entitled to it, it was decided.

The school sections and school areas of the township were ordered assessed by by-law.

Permission was granted the reeve and treasurer to borrow \$20,000 to meet the current expenditure of the township. It was decided that the voters' list should be made up alphabetically as in former years.

The following accounts were passed for payment: Bell Telephone Co., \$885; Geo. MacDonald and Co., \$55.92; Bursar, Ontario Hospital, Woodstock, \$46.00; Dept. of Health of Ont., \$3.03; A. W. Benton \$21.00; A. W. Benton, \$4.

Relief accounts as presented by the relief officer, amounting to \$112.52 were passed for payment. Sheep claims were ordered paid as follows: H. L. Bell, \$50; Walter Lawson \$80.00; A. N. Stark, valuator, \$12.00.

Claims for foxes destroyed in Esqueing were as follows: Fred Brooks, Limehouse, \$5.00; Gerald McLeod, Acton, \$15.00; L. A. Cox, Georgetown, \$5.00.

The treasurer was instructed to pay the road accounts of \$14,432.19 as presented by the road superintendent.

Reeve George Currie presided at the meeting with deputy-reeve George Leslie, councillors H. Craig Reid, Wilfred Bird and Walter Linham present.

A special meeting of council was held on Wednesday, July 11 when council recommended to the North Halton High School District Board that they hold off any building program until such time as the new county system of assessment is stabilized.
