On a motion of Reeves Geo. Currie and J. E. Ellenton the County Colinell recommended the purchase of the 400 acre block where the beaver are located and also approved of the idea of reimbursing the Township of Nausagaweys for any additional expense in the raising of the road in the vicinity of the beaver dam made necessary as a_result of the beavers' activity in conserving water.

County Council's action is in accord with a resolution passed some months ago by the Halton Consorvation Committee, which pointed out that the conservation of water is of paramount importance to urhan and rural dwellers alike in the County of Holton. 


