COIN UPROOTED FROM RESTING PLACE ON MILL ST. BY PAVING

There's no telling just how long a heavy dark coin, lined with green, has been lost on Mill St. It was lost the year it was minted. Acton was a hamlet, part of the township of Esquesing. It was lost the year a post office was granted to the growing centre and Robert Swann, who had chosen the name "Acton" for the little place some years before, became the first postmaster.

The 1844 half penny was found last Saturday morning in a heap of earth that was dug up in the process of leveling prior to paving by Hugh Graham, who lives on No. 7 highway.

On one side of the thick old coin is a crest with a beaver, thistle, tree and shamrock and the words "Concordia Salus". On the other side there is a picture of a building and around the outside reads "Province of Canada".

The piece had obviously been in the ground a long time and had to be cleaned before it could be read. Luckily the 107-year-old coin remarked some changes in Acton when it again saw the light of day Saturday.

OBITUARY

Pioneer Family's Last Member Dies

After a short illness, Mrs. Robt. H. Reid passed peacefully away at her late residence, 173 London St. S., Hamilton, on Tuesday, August 28th, 1951, in her 88th year.

Mrs. Reid was formerly Betsy (Bessie) McKinnon, daughter of the late Neil McKinnon, and Margaret McMillan. She was the last member of this pioneer family of Erin Township.

She was a resident of Erin Township for over half a century, being born on Lot 20, Fourth Line, on January 4th, 1863. She married Robert H. Reid and they made their home on Lot 8, Third Line, on the farm which is now occupied by their son Hugh.

In 1925 they moved to Acton, where Mr. Reid passed away in 1930. Nine years ago Mrs. Reid and her daughter Laura, moved to Hamilton, where she resided until the time of her death.

Two sons and four daughters are left to mourn the passing of a loving mother, Hugh M., Mrs. Harold L. Griffin (Jessie); Mrs. Mervin Hilliard (Winnifred), all of Erin Township; Mrs. Chas. Landsborough (Marjorie), Acton; Joseph N. and Laura K. of Hamilton, and 12 grandchildren. Two daughters, Mrs. Robt. Currie (Ethel), and Mable predeceased her.

Mrs. Reid was of a quiet, home-loving disposition. A faithful member of the Baptist Church, she was seldom absent from church service as long as her health permitted.

The funeral was held on August 30th, with a short service at the Speckhamer-Hiltz funeral home in Hamilton, followed by a service in the Acton Baptist Church, conducted by a former pastor, Rev. J. W. Boyd, of Guelph. During the service Douglas Peck of Georgetown, grandson by marriage, sang "Sweet Peace, the Gift of God's Love".

The many floral tributes showed the high esteem in which she was held.

The pallbearers were Neil McKinnon, Fred McMillan, Lawrence Burt, Edgar Young, Norman McLaughlin and Ross McKinnon, all nephews of the deceased. The flower bearers were Garnet Sinclair, Smith Griffin, Clarence Reid, Douglas Peck, and Earl Sovereign.

Interment was in Coningsby Cemetery, Friends attended from Detroit, Durham, Toronto, Hamilton and Burlington.
