Council appointed the Finance Committee to prepare a brief as requested by the recently established Provincial - Municipal Committee.

This group was set up by the Provincial government to investigate taxation between the province and municipalities.

Sewer accounts totalling \$11,644.57 were approved for payment.

The Department of Highways was petitioned for the grant on roads for expenditures to date totalling \$32,815.14.

A motion was passed instructing the clerk to take the necessary action to collect the water and sewer account of H. V. Dron.

Council accepted the August report of the Provincial Police showing 16 cases prosecuted, 11 convictions, 1 imprisonment, 10 fines collected, 46 investigations carried out, \$65 in fines imposed and 75 inspections of premises.

The Bell Telephone Co. served an application on the municipality for increased rates. Council filed an objection to the increase but three councillors voted against the objection.

A letter from E. R. Lauder, secretary of the Halton County Fire Committee, expressed a hope that Acton was not reluctant to participate in their mutual aid program since the Acton Fire Chief had not attended the first meeting.

H. S. Dunham, executive secretary of the Ontario Medical Association, said he felt that Acton, with its present population, would be a satisfactory location for another medical practitioner and would keep it on file.

Approval was given the plan to tile Acton Blvd. from Arthur to Mill St. leaving an open ditch from Peel to Arthur with catch basins to be installed. Cost of tile for the project was estimated at \$90.

William Braeken and M. Mac-Grath of the Norwich Union Insurance Co. were present to discuss the possibility of reducing rates on town insurance. Members of the Finance and Building Committees were to meet the gentlemen at a later date.

J. Kingsmill suggested that he was entitled to a share of the town's insurance since he was now a licensed agent. The letter was filed.

Assessment Commissioner Frank Crump was granted a salary increase of \$200 at the last meeting of council, but it was inadvertently omitted in the regular report.

Mayor Tyler presided at this regular meeting with Reeve Hargrave, Deputy Reeve Stewart and Councillors Fryer, Taylor, Thompson, Wood Greer and Week present.

Chief Lab Chemist Leaves For Study

Frederick A. Helton, B.S.A., the retiring chief chemist at Baxter Laboratories, is leaving this week for six and one-half years to study law at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. He is a graduate of chemistry at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

The new chief chemist, recently appointed by the directors of Baxter Laboratories, is Forman V. Lawrence. He also graduated in chemistry from the O.A.C. in 1943. After serving until 1946 with the Canadian Army, he spent a year on the staff at O.A.C. in the fall of 1947. He came with Baxter Laboratories in Acton where he has been employed as assistant chief chemist until the present time.

Armand J. Braida, B.S.A., who succeeds Mr. Lawrence, started with Baxter's in June this year. He is also a graduate of the O.A.C. and majored in chemistry. Mr. Braida is a native son of Acton. At Guelph he was prominent in extra-curricular activities such as the college band, the Photography Club and various other societies.
