**Hessian Mites on Hessian Fly**

In our column last week we referred to a visit from Prof. H. W. Goble, Provincial Entomologist at the Ontario Agricultural College. Prof. Goble made a second inspection visit this past week to two of Halton's fields very badly infested with Hessian Fly. Careful microscopic examination of the crop residues in these fields revealed practically no live larva present.

To quote Prof. Goble in his brief report, "This looks very, very encouraging." Now that the moisture situation has been rectified, those intending to sow fall wheat can we feel proceed with some confidence to sow their crop any time between Sept. 15 and 25th.
