Miss Alma Bradley is now attending the Robinson Business College in Milton.

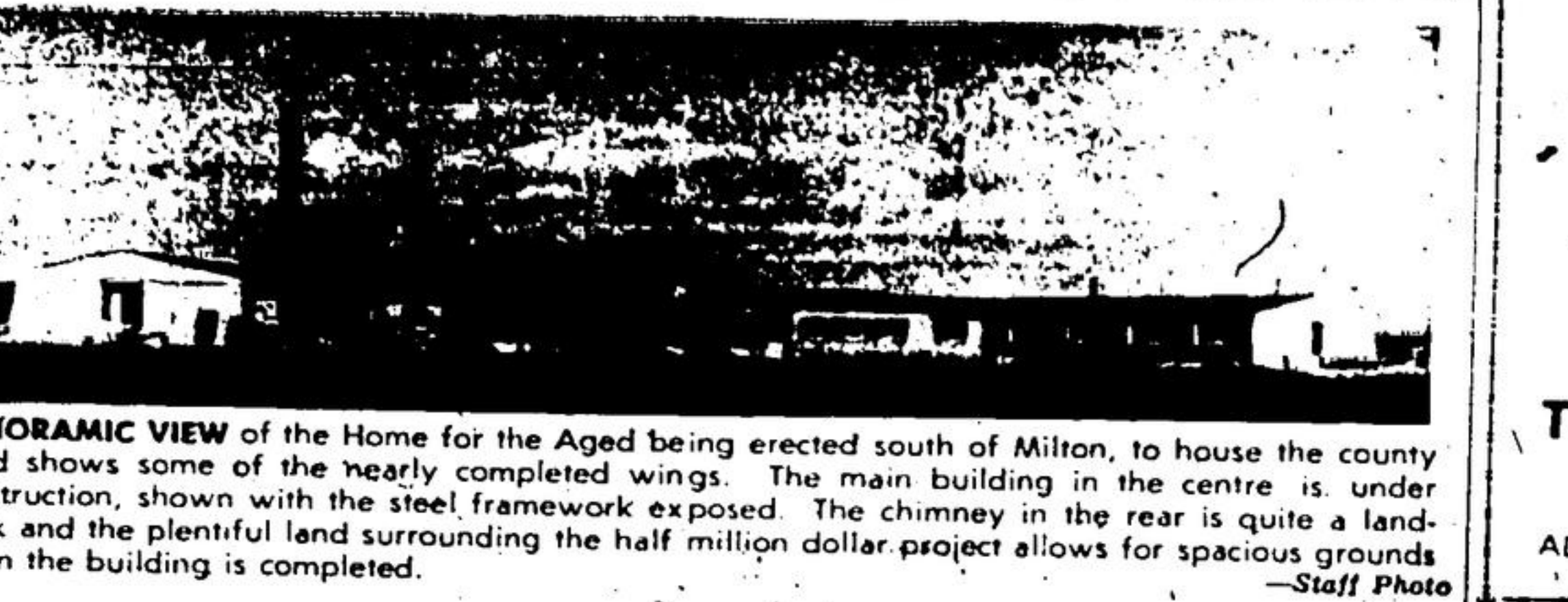
Make Spectacular Weed Killer Steps

Herbicides or weed killers have made a spectacular advance in the last five years and, according to the latest Dominion Bureau of Statistics survey, are now the most important class of pesticides in Canada. Last year a total of over \$15,000,000 worth of all pesticides were sold in Canada, and of these nearly \$5,750,000 worth were weed killers. It is estimated that last year some twelve to thirteen million acres of crop land were treated with 2-4-D in Western Canada. This compares with thirty million acres treated in the United States in the same year. This year even larger acreages are expected to be treated.

Approximately sixty-five firms supply the Canadian farmer with nearly two hundred and twenty

different formulations, says C. H. Jefferson, who points out that these are registered under the Pest Control Products Act of the Department of Agriculture before they are offered for sale. By this procedure, all claims and directions for use are checked for accuracy and practical application. With the full cooperation of the trade, Canadian herbicides are perhaps the best labelled in the world in that the claims and directions for use follow a standard pattern and instruct the purchaser on the most efficacious use of the products.

Reliable estimates place the value of herbicides to the Canadian farmer in the form of increased yields and lower production costs—at over \$150,000,000 in the last five years. This has been accomplished at a cost of only about \$30,000,000 to the farmer. Chemical weed control has now become an established farm practice.
