OBITUARY George B. Wallace Dies In 88th Year

George B. Wallace, of Wellington Place, who died at Guelph General Hospital Sunday after a lengthy illness, was born at Moffat and farmed for 13 years near Acton. Mr. Wallace, who was in his 88th year, was married in 1887 to Josephine Newell and last March the couple celebrated their 64th wedding anniversary, receiving congratulations from the King and government heads.

He farmed at West Flamboro, Nassagaweya, Carlisle and Arkell before moving to Guelph in 1912. He returned 20 years ago. He was a well known market gardener and ardent horticulturist and a member of Paisley Memorial Church, Guelph.

Funeral service was held Wednesday with interment in Woodlawn Cemetery.

He leaves his wife, Josephine Newell; four sons, William George of Eden Mills, Joseph H. of Hamilton, Reginald and Fred of Guelph; two daughters, Mrs. R. (Mina) Carter of Arkell and Mrs. W. (Ethel) McIlwraith of Guelph and one sister, Miss Ann Jane Wallace of Guelph.
