County Accepts Simpson's Tender

Elliston, as no further action was taken by council.

Council returned to the assessment committee, a communication from the County Assessor, Ford Rodgers, who was seeking an increase in salary for himself as well as his staff. He claimed Halton was paying lower wages than other counties. The committee will report to council at the November meeting.

Council took no action when Mr. Palmer urged them to make a formal application to the Board of Transport Commissioners to have a subway built on the Guelph Line near Burlington. Mr. Palmer reported an interview with the Minister of Highways, adding scarcity of steel was a contributing factor in not building the subway at the present time. He also learned there was not an application before the Board in Ottawa.

In a request from Charles E. Porter, a real estate broker, council was asked to consider purchasing additional land adjoining their present property. He said this could be purchased for \$285 an acre as the purchaser of the Maur farm did not desire the large acreage. The matter was left for the Committee to decide.

Members approved a request from officials of the St. Peter's Infirmary, Hamilton, who asked an increase of rates for county patients. Council agreed the increase should be from \$2.50 a day to \$3.50. It was explained the increased operating costs necessitated them asking for the increase.

Sheriff Robertson was present to board of directors to assist in providing running water at the Lowville Community Park. As no specified amount was mentioned, he was asked to have the directors state so in a communication to council before action could be taken.

Mr. Robertson stated the amount involved included the cost of pipe and materials, as farmers and members provided the labor.

Accounts approved and ordered to be paid included, finance committee, \$4,529.94; hospitalization, \$3,485.07; assessment, \$79.75; county roads, \$17,289.25; county buildings, \$283.94; printing, \$294.07; agriculture and reforestation, \$465.00; Halton Home for the Aged, \$36,474.66.

Council adjourned to meet November 13.
