Marjorie Wynn-Williams, bi-lingual now living at Llanrwst in North Wales has been writing scripts for the British Broadcasting Corporation for years, some in English and some in Welsh. Her greatest interest in life, apart from writing lies in travel-before the last war she spent a great deal of her time exploring Europe. She visited sixteen or seventeen different countries, including Lapland and the Baltic states, always on her own and always on the lookout for something interesting and amusing -and she is one of the people to whom amusing things seem to

She has endured long spells of ill health in recent years but hopes to be on the move again soon. In the meantime she travels vicariously by writing adventure serials

for the BBC's "Children's Hour." These serials are exceedingly popular with young listeners and always have the same cast. 




