Messrs. J. Hurst and W. Mattocks on behalf of the Acton Branch of the Legion asked co-operation of Council in the Remembrance Day services on Sunday, November 11 ing. and permission to hold Poppy Days on the Friday and Saturday previous. Council agreed and accepted the invitation to attend the service in a body.

Fire Chief Dawkins asked that Council give official approval of the mutual aid plan of fire protection and also check the coverage to see that insurance and compensation was provided in this type of work. He asked that \$5 be appropriated for incidentals such as postage etc. for the Secretary. He pointed out that at present a ruling of Council forbade the truck to leave town and if mutual aid was to operate it would be necessary to rescind this ruling.

The committee appointed sumbit ted one proposal for alterations to the fire hall to accommodate the new fire truck. One sketch of a proposed garage was submitted by Hobby.' J. B. Mackenzie and Son. This garage was 24 feet by 30 feet 2 inches of concrete and brick veneer construction. The cost was estimated at \$2,635.00 and probable changes to the outside stairway would be \$36.00. The building would adjoin the present fire hall.

A motion to dispose of the old fire truck as a fire fighting unit was lost by a vote.

- It was decided to wait for further information on three proposals before making any decision on the needed building. A committee was appointed to get these proposals from the various builders in town and give it immediate attention

The Clerk was instructed to send an account to Beamish Co. for cement supplied when work was being done on the streets.

It was decided to have stencils made for use on road signs to be painted on the pavement.
