# Mervyn Kennedy Dies Suddenly

Herbert Mervyn Kennedy, a former hardware merchant in Acton and well-known here succumbed to a sudden heart attack at his home in Owen Sound on Thanksgiving

Mr. Kennedy, who celebrated his 57th birthday the previous day, was the son of Mrs. John W. Kennedy of Georgetown and the late Mr. Kennedy. He was a veteran of both wars, and was wounded overseas in World War. I. In the last war, he was a major with the Veteran Quarels.
