Must Mark Nov. 11 On Sunday, Same

Remembrance day, November 11, which falls on Sunday this year, cannot be celebrated on any other day, a State Department official said recently.

Provision is made in the act setting up other statutory holidays—such as Christmas, New Year's Day, Dominion Day and the King's birthday—that if they fall on a Sunday, the following day is a holiday. However, the act setting up Remembrance Day makes no such provision.
