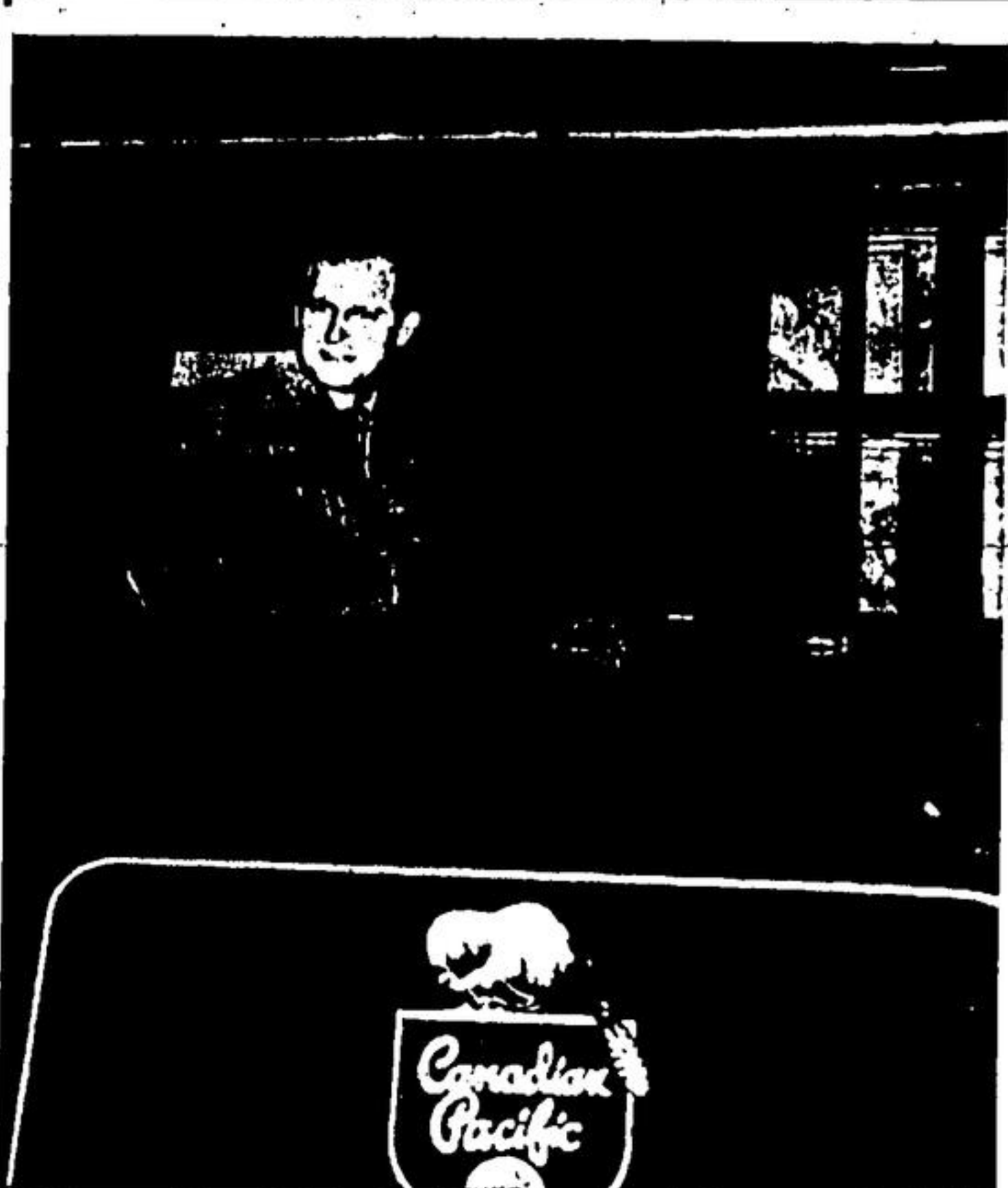

There's less than a month to mail those Christmas parcels and cards to other countries, postmaster Frank Terry reminds everyone. Mailing deadlines for the United Kingdom, Europe and the United States are as follows this year:

To the United Kingdom, letters must be mailed by November 28th to ensure delivery and parcels by November 25.

To Europe, letters by November 25 and parcels by Nov. 21.

To the United States, parcels not later than December 8. The earliest deadline is less than two weeks away.
