

THREE CANDIDATES IN CONTEST FOR SEAT IN LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Three Halton candidates officially tossed their hats into the ring for the Provincial election at the nominating meeting attended by between 25 and 30 in Milton Town Hall last Thursday. The three candidates, Stanley Hall, Progressive Conservative; Angus Langille, C.C.F. and Dr. M. Deans, Liberal, all qualified on being nominated.

Nominations were held between one and two o'clock and these are usually followed by speeches from the candidates but because of the small attendance the meeting was adjourned.

In seconding the motion for adjournment T. Ramsdave pointed out that the meeting had been rather unexpected and he "could find few who ever heard of it. It's a waste of time to have intelligent men talk to empty seats", he declared.

Stanley Hall, M.P.P., declared that he had been coming to nominations in Milton for about 40 years and this was the first time he

could recall having the post-nominal meeting cancelled. He suggested that perhaps "some had forgotten" nominations were to be held two weeks before election in winter months and one week before in summer months.

Commenting on the size of the crowd, Dr. Deans, Liberal candidate, said "Could you call it a crowd?" He blamed the unfavourable weather and the lack of sufficient publicity for the small attendance.

At the last provincial election in 1948 approximately 100 attended the nomination meeting one week before the election when it was described as an old-time type with catcalls and boos, applause and cheers as the candidates spoke for no longer than their allotted 30 minutes.

Candidates in the 1948 election were Stanley Hall, Progressive Conservative; Dr. M. Deans, Liberal and Bert Adamson, C.C.F.

MORE CHEQUES CASHED

Report Issued On Forum Discussions

County Farm Forum Secretary, Mrs. K. A. Ellenton, reported that results on the forum discussion held recently, "Are Co-operatives Democratic?"

The first question: How successful is the annual meeting in representing the views of the whole membership? Answers to this question were varied. While all admitted the Co-op annual meeting was the place where the views of the whole membership are given, some were of the opinion that members voted their views at the annual meeting but others complained the membership was not largely represented, unless a meal was served.

Others again voiced their answer in the fact that at these annual meetings members acted upon the saying, "Silence gives consent". In other words, they approved of the management of the Co-op as it is being conducted.

The second question: How are matters of policy decided for the Co-op? The policy of the Co-op originates with the executive and is subject to approval of the membership. This was the answer of the majority of Forums to this question.

The third question: What effort does the Co-op make to keep its members and employees informed (a) on the business of the Co-op? Answers included the yearly statement (financial) and the advertising in local papers of seasonal price list. One forum stated very bluntly, not enough. (b) On the Co-op ideas in general? Answers pointed to the provincial publication, the Rural Co-operator, edited by Mr. Kingsley Brown, which should be read by all Co-op members.

The fourth question: What other problems in democratic control are faced by this Co-op? This was answered, first by members failing to attend the annual Co-op meeting, by non-active members dealing elsewhere and the educational problem. One forum stated one problem was the fact that a successful manager might become autocratic, therefore a board of managers needs to be alive and on the job.

District Governor Addresses Y's Men

Y's Men's club district governor Wilfred Roberts was the special guest at the regular Y's Men's meeting in the Y.M.C.A. on Thursday, November 8. Mr. Roberts was recognized at a recent international convention as one of the four outstanding governors of Y's Men's International.

A special award was made to W. Wolfe, a member of the Acton club's golf team which finished as runners-up in the golf tournament at the regional convention in Orillia recently. Other members of the team were J. Creighton, B. Rachlin and F. Lawrence.

A report was given on the sale of turkey tickets and a sing song was led by Ted Hansen and Frank Elliott. Mr. Elliott is a soloist and choir leader in Guelph and the Acton Public School music supervisor.

Remodelling of the kitchen, was discussed. The cost for the complete remodelling would be approximately \$1000. A committee was appointed to call for tenders with H. Arble as chairman.

Swimming was discussed; an instructor may be available in Guelph.

In his address to the group, Mr. Roberts stated that Y's Men's clubs are an international movement within an international movement. "This link has been instrumental in making Y's Men's clubs something more than just a supper club," he said. Y's Men should be members of the Y in fact as well as in name, the speaker reminded, stressing they should do all they can to further boys' and young adult work.

Mr. Roberts was introduced by W. Wolfe.
