A comparison of motor vehicle accidents in the district including Halton, Brant, Norfolk and Wentworth counties from January to June of 1950 and 1951 shows an increase of 27.3 per cent. Three Candidates Seek Election In Prov. Contest

Over 26,000 voters are eligible to poll their votes in the provincial election next Thursday in Halton County. As a matter of fact the preliminary lists show 26,270 in the nine municipalities of the county. Every British subject over 21 years of age is eligible to cast a ballot. In the provincial election in 1948 there were 16,050 who made use of the franchise. There are three candidates in Halton representing the three parties prominent in Ontario.

Stanley L. Hall is the Progressive-Conservative candidate. He has been the choice of Halton electors in three previous elections and now seeks a fourth term. Having been in public office for so long, Mr. Hall is naturally well-known to most electors throughout the county. He is a well-known farmer resident of the Hornby district.
