## Three Candidates Seek Election In Prov. Contest

Over 26,000 voters are eligible to poll their votes in the provincial election next Thursday in Halton County. As a matter of fact the preliminary lists show 26,270 in the nine municipalities of the county. Every British subject over 21 years of age is eligible to cast a ballot. In the provincial election in 1948 there were 16,039 who made use of the franchise. There are three candidates in Halton representing the three parties prominent in Ontario.

-Stanley L. Hall is the Progressive-Conservative canidate. He has been the choice of Halton electors in three previous elections and now seeks a fourth term. Having been in public office for so long, Mr. Hall is naturally well-known to most electors throughout the county. He is a well-known farmer School Area No. 1, in the Municipresident of the Hornby district.

Residents of the north and of Halton County remember that it was p.m. during Mr. Hall's tenure of office Highway between Acton and Milton became a paved surface and a fine highway from north to south instead of the patch upon patch Orange Hall, Campbellville, which prevailed for over 25 years.

Under the Liberal banner the candidate is again Dr. Murcay Deans of Oakville, who was also a candidate in the election of 1948 Knatchbull Hall, Knatchbull. and polled a total vote just 118 short of the successful member. 
