Garage Closing By-Law Approved

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The Minister of Lands and Forests could hear complaints on the survey and give his ruling. Council turned the matter over to the Planning Board, Solicitor and Surveyor.

F. W. Smallacombe Guelph, representing the Wellington-Waterloo Plumbers' Association of master plumbers suggested that the town plumbers should be licensed for greater ease in enforcing plumbing by-laws.

He suggested, under questioning, that the Association would probably be willing to set up a three man board to test plumbers for licensing.

Regarding the closing of the entrance to the lane behind Bower Ave. houses with an entrance on Alice St. and Bower Ave. Solicitor Leatherland explained the procedure was to give the by-law two readings and hand it over to the County Judge for arbitration when complaints could be heard.

A letter from Dale and Bennett, representing the petitioners against closing the lane, asked to be notified of the procedure. The clerk was instructed to notify the residents when the by-law would be given two readings at council.

Regarding the request of Charles Mason for a right of way over the town property past Baxter Laboratories, the solicitor pointed out that a provision in the building by-law required a building to face on a street and although a right of way could be granted, no building permits could be issued for a house on this property.

The road committee was instructed to investigate the removal of a tree that Mr. Mason complained of, at the last meeting.

M. McMillan, on behalf of the Acton Legion, requested permission to erect a two-foot high fence in front of the cenotaph on Mill St. Council approved the fence at the two-foot height as long as it was in accordance with the by-law.

Deputy-reeve Stewart reported that it would be a simple matter to mount the snow blower on the front of the grader and the cost would be less than \$100. This action was approved, the work to be done by the Halton Manufacturing Co.

Council authorized payment of \$76 to Hugh Graham if the account was not settled by Spartan Contracting Co. on Monday of this week. The amount was for damage to his property in installing the system.

The use of unit heaters at the disposal plant was approved by council.

H. R. Parker or J. Croughan were to represent the town at a meeting to decide on the establishment of a Credit Valley Conservation Authority in Georgetown.

Council was notified of a hearing for complaints against milk prices to be held on Monday before the Milk Control Board, at which milk could be sold in the Acton market.

Mayor Tyler presided at this regular meeting with Reeve Hargrave, Deputy-reeve Stewart, Councilors Wieck, Greer, Wood, Thompson, Taylor and Fryer present.

The Y.M.C.A. are contemplating moving their service in the building. The Superintendent was given instructions on the work to be undertaken by the Commission.

Notice was received from the Check Writer Co. that the insurance on the machine expires December 1, 1951. The premium on the bond is \$30. It was decided not to renew this insurance.
