COUNTY NIGHT SCHOOL FILLS NEED, FORUM MEMBERS AGREE

On Monday evening, December 3, Farm Forum members commenced studying a new series with "Opportunities for Cultural Activities," as the topic for discussion. The first question was "What work do you do in your home or around the farm that you would consider artistic or an outlet for creative talent?"
There was a great similarity of opinion in the long list of creative talents, but Mount Nemo summed it all up very thoroughly stating "Creative talent is needed to grow good crops and to keep a farm, stock and implements in good condition."
Hammockburn agreed with this, but added "If a thing is worth doing at all, it's worth doing right." The list included quilt and rug-making, picture painting, flower and vegetable gardening, interior decorating, ploughing a straight furrow, carpenter work, cabinet making, and fitting and preparing of live stock for the show ring.
"It has been said that every one should have a hobby," that is, a keen interest or occupation outside one's work. What do you think? This was answered 100 per cent "yes", but most regretted the lack of time from other pressing duties and responsibilities, to devote as much time as they would like.
The third question was "What could your community do to develop activities in music, drama, handicrafts and other arts?" All reports agreed on the advantage of being centrally located in and around Milton, where night classes are held during the winter months. One forum mentioned sending leaders to courses where drama and handicrafts are taught; these leaders pass the knowledge gained to their own groups in their own community. Another group stated that their community is so largely organized now, that there just isn't time to do justice to everything.
"Is outside help needed? If so, what kind would you suggest?" Ligny says—good instructors are needed, while Boyne claims all this is obtained through night classes, which are now starting in Milton for a second term, with courses in art, handicrafts, sewing, etc. sponsored by the Department of Agriculture and assisted by Community Programs Branch, Department of Adult Education.

Ontario Is Giant Who Keeps Rolling

Expansion and growth of manufacturing and industry throughout Ontario during the current year is likened, in recent surveys, to "an industrial giant that just can't stop growing." Expenditures on this program are placed in excess of \$600 million, whereas normal years of expansion run about \$100 million the Ontario Trade and Industry Branch, Department of Planning reports.
One survey, The Financial Post, foresees an era for Ontario of \$6 billions of expansion, reiterating the statement that this Province "will eventually rival such industrial giants as the Midlands of Britain and the Detroit-Cleveland area of the United States."
While one "hopes" Ontario won't ever become thoroughly industrial, still the county reflects the general trend.
Ontario's share in Canada's total manufactured products is 30.5 per cent, and 66 per cent of Ontario's labor force of 1,800,000 people depend on wages and salaries for income directly from the manufacturing industry. The percentage of payroll dollars is greater with 70 per cent of payroll income coming from manufacturing.
The current expansion and growth surveys show, is not in terms of new industry, but in expansion of industries already operating successfully here. Only 10 per cent of current Ontario expansion is attributable to new industry. Of 27 new industries—and there are in excess of 14,000 industries operating—listed by the Trade and Industry Branch for this year 22 established outside the metropolitan area that is bounded by Lake Ontario, Port Credit, Brampton and Ajax.
Industry is reported showing an increasing interest in the Eastern Ontario area, due, officials say, not only to congestion in the built-up areas of the central and southwestern sections, but more particularly to regional promotion in the east where 32 municipalities have sponsored joint development with the leadership of the Eastern Ontario Association Boards of Trade and co-operation of the municipal division of the Trade and Industry Branch.
Approximately 55 per cent of all footwear in Canada is being made with other-than-leather soles, a survey shows.
