Illness Forces Resignation Mayor-Elect Thos. Salmon

'All will Yegret to learn that Mayor-Elect Thomas Salmon was taken suddenly ill following the municipal elections in Acton last week and has been confined to his bed ever since. His illness is of such a nature that complete rest for a lengthy period is essential for his re-

Mr. Salmon realizes the importance of the Mayor's office and regrets that his illness has interfered with his assumption of office. The following letter to the clerk sets forth his position and with the consent of the Mayor-Elect we publish the authentic letter of resignation which he agreed was much preferable to rumors and guesses which might be circulated in town.

Acton, Ontario, December 17, 1951. Mr. J. McGeachie, Clerk,

Town of Acton, Acton, Ontario. Dear Sir:

Shortly after my election to the Mayoralty of the Town of Acton, I suffered a severe heart attack and am now confined to my bed. physician advises that I will be laid up for considerable time as a result of my sudden illness.

It is therefore with sincere regret that I am obliged to inform you that I will not be able to take the oath of office as Mayor of the Town of Acton; and I hereby reaign from the Mayorality of the Town of Acton for the year 1952.

I appreciate the confidence which the citizens of Acton placed in me and, as I said before. I sincerely regret the fact that I am forced MAYOR-ELECT T. Salmon submitto take this step.

Yours truly, (Signed) Thomas W. Salmor All will wish for Mr. Salmon a prompt recovery and return to good health, but for the present, we understand complete rest and visitors are the doctor's orders for his recovery.

Decision Reversed On Crown Appeal

Judge W. N. Robinson reversed a decision of Magistrate Langdon this week in hearing a Crown appeal and convicted George Pelletier on a charge of obstructing ors of the county at Nelson Townpolice. Pelletler was fined \$25 and costs of \$86. Crown Attorney Lloyd C. Dingle made the appeal.

Magistrate Langdon had dismissed the charge against Pelletier laid by Constable Leonard Chambers of the Geprgetown provincial police detachment. The case was heard August 20.

Constable Chambers related that he had been called to a Main St. apartment in Georgetown to medlate in a fight between Pelletler and Alfred Bobileau. The officer claimed that Pelletier jumped on him and struck him in the chest and on the jaw with his fist.

Four other witnesses besides th constable testified at the hearing of the appeal. Judge Robinson considered that Pelletler had been intoxicated.
