ADDITION TO the Acton Public School was making progress in July and quickly taking shape. Seen in the top photo is the section workmen were trying to complete by September. It includes the boiler room and a classroom and joins the old building with an inside passageway. In the lower photo the steel beam structure is shown, the front part of which will be the auditorium, included in the new addition. Plumbing was completed before the cement floor was laid.

Although the bulldozer had been at work on the site, the first digging with the steam shovel began Thursday, May 3rd when the land was scooped up to make room for the cement foundations and the boiler room of the school which is now operating.
