Hello Homemakers! When we add a touch of glamour to the left-over chicken it will do the honors for a company meal. Give you something to crow about, too, when it's Baked Chicken. The topping made with eggs and cheese is "top" Either chicken or turkey meat will do—and such dishes are easy to prepare.

BAKED CHICKEN CASSEROLE:
1 can condensed mushroom soup
1/2 cup milk
1 cup cubed cooked chicken
2 cups cooked green beans
4 eggs separated
1/2 cup grated old cheese

Combine soup and milk in 1 1/2 quart casserole; add chicken and beans. Bake in oven of 375 degrees for 10 minutes. Meanwhile, beat egg yolks, add cheese. Fold in beaten egg whites and pile this mixture on the chicken. Continue baking for 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

SCALLOPED HAM AND POTATOES
8 sweet potatoes (sliced thin)
1 1/2 tps salt
2 1/2 cups scalded milk
2 tpsps flour
1 small onion
3 tpsps bacon fat
1 slice ham, 1 inch thick

Arrange layer of potatoes in bottom of 12 by 8 inch casserole; sprinkle with salt, pepper, flour and onion. Add remaining potatoes, dripping and scalded milk. Top with ham. Bake in oven of 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Serves 6.

JIFFY CASSEROLE
1/2 cup raw rice
1 1/2 cups tomatoes
1 tin cubed meat
2 tpsps chopped onion
2 tpsps pimento
1/2 cup grated old cheese
1/2 cup bread crumbs

Cook rice until tender in a quart of boiling salted water to which a tablespoon of vinegar has been added. Rinse in cold water. Mix all ingredients except cheese and crumbs in a casserole and season with cayenne, salt and celery salt. Top with cheese and crumbs. Bake in oven of 350 degrees for half an hour. Serves 6.

Teen-Age Singer Debuts in Comedy

One of the many musical romances in Paramount's "Here Comes the Groom," the big new Bing Crosby romantic comedy coming to the Roxy Theatre is provided by Anna Maria Alberghetti, sensational fifteen-year-old Italian soprano.

TAKE A TIP
Juices left over from canned fruit make delicious sherbet toppings for desserts, and they are easy to prepare. Freeze them to a "mush" in the ice cube tray of the electric refrigerator, then remove and whip with mixer, re-freeze and keep at "normal" settings until serving time.

Try powdered sugar instead of flour when rolling out cookies dough. The powdered sugar will not form a white film on the dough. Sprinkle the cookie cutter too and prevent sticking.

Prepare sandwiches of meat, cheese, peanut butter or cooked fowl, and wrap in aluminum foil, then place in freezing unit of the refrigerator. These will freshen in about 1/2 hour or can be toasted when frozen on the broiling pan. A wonderful idea for company.

Cranberries can be mixed into muffins, used with apple quarters for an upside-down cake or mixed with chopped blanched almonds for a spread between split tea biscuits.
