Mayor Rachlin announced this morning that work on the Sewerage Disposal Plant on the third line east of Acton began this week after weather conditions had partially cleared. No extimate of the length of time required to complete the plant was released. In a personal inspection of the plant on Wednesday, Mr. Rachlin found that work had recommenced on Monday or Tuesday of this week. Weather conditions have delayed operations at the plant for some
