as opposition to having papers leave the town office. The Mayor commented, "I think the council is showing very poor appreciation" for work done.

Deputy-reeve Stewart reported on a meeting with representatives of the paving company and the Department of Highways regarding the Main and M'Il Street paving. Council was advised to let summer traffic go over the road after patching and anything that developed at the end of the summer would be taken care of by the company.

From Government House, Ottawa, came a message from Her Majesty the Queen. "I am commanded by the Queen to express to you and to all those on whose behalf you wrote, her sincere thanks for your kind message of sympathy in her great loss. Her Majesty greatly appreciates their thought of her and her family at this time."

Council refused to pay any extra money for the location of a fresh water well at the disposal plant. It was reported that the original estimate of \$250 had been exceeded by about \$100 since the first well dug was not satisfactory.

A bill from Kearns, McKinnon, Clark and Kearns, law firm for \$281.50 for prosecution under a town by-law against T. Szymuck, was paid. The case was reviewed in a brief presented by the law firm.

Council refused payment of \$30 for the replacement of a piece of equipment allegedly lost at the disposal plant site.

No parking signs were asked to be replaced in front of the Roxy Theatre.

Deputy-reeve Stewart reported that Esqueing was preparing an agreement for approval of the town regarding the maintenance costs on the third line, a portion of which is in the town.

The Mayor reported being approached by a group interested in box lacrosse who sought tentative permission to use the arena in the next season before making arrangements. Council agreed to grant permission pending financial and other arrangements.

The Provincial Police report for February was accepted.

L. Garner asked adjustment of the taxes on his property from which the house was removed. It was left over for the attention of the Court of Revision.

The Knox Choir expressed their appreciation to council for the use of the town hall for practice of their play.

Acton's share of fines levied in town was received amounting to \$14.68.
