ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

The lot now occupied by Elliott Bros. General Store, Braida's Shoe Store and Hinton's store, was originally bought from the Adams' estate by Mr. Benzie. He built a store on the corner and a warehouse where the Hinton store is.

In those days the stores kept both dry goods and wet goods. Many a barrel of old-time whiskey went into the cellar of what was, in those early days, called the "Glasgow House", in com-

pany with barrels of molasses and vinegar. Back in the sixties, Charles and James Symon bought the Benzie property and business. In those days sugar came in great hogsheads holding half a ton or more. Often when the children were passing the warehouse from school a good sized lump of that muscavado went to a blue eyed maiden, the gift of the store's errand boy.


