Report Explains Town's Deficit of \$25,337.21

Council accepted the annual auditor's report at their meeting or Tuesday night. The report presents a complete financial picture of the town's operations in 1951. The auditor explains "The deficit incurred in the year of \$25,337.21 is a matter of grave concern. There are three principal items causing this deficit. Plan First County-Wide TB Survey For This Year

Officials of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association hope to have TB chest X-rays of 25,000 in Halton when the first countywide survey is carried on for six weeks in November and December of this year. Dr Mather, of the Halton County Health Unit, reported in a recent interview that Ontario had the lowest TB rate of any other place in the world. He pointed with pride to the extremely low rate in the county but warned that with the expansion and industrialization of the county, extra precautions would be necessary since persons would be moving in from TB areas.

Dr. Mather reported that 1,300 chest X-rays had been made in the county high schools last year and all school employees from bus drivers to teachers had also been required to take the examination.
