"With conditions as they are, it seems unfair to burden the taxpayer to give 7 1/2 cents per capita when they are only required to give 50 cents per capita."

Councillor Taylor suggested that the resolution accepting the estimates automatically settled the Library grant.

The by-law setting the 64 mill rate was passed.

Council decided to ask Mr. Richardson from the Department of Highways to meet with members of the Road Committee and look over the paving of last fall. This action was decided on following a letter from the K. J. Beamish Construction Co. setting out how they would rectify the present condition of the road.

Mayor Rachlin suggested patching, as agreed to by the contractor, might not be enough and it might be necessary to resurface some or all of the road.

Councillor Taylor reported on a meeting with the Gifts Committee regarding contributions to the new school. Council decided that if anything was given from council it would be done by individual members and not by the taxpayers.

A special committee meeting was to be arranged to deal with the renewal of the Provincial Police contract in which the rates had been increased.

Screens for the pump house windows and sewer hose were to be discussed by the sewer committee with the Public Utilities Commission.

The road committee promised to investigate a request from M. Dyrw on Willow St. that a tree in front of his house was in a dangerous condition.

The Department of Highways was to be asked for more protection on the Main St. South bridge. It was reported that a woman had slipped over the bridge and had to hang onto the rail one icy day until someone came along.
