## QUILTING, PROGRAM CONTESTS PLANNED BY W.I. DIRECTORS

This year, the Halton Women's Institute directors' meeting, which was held in Milton on Monday afternoon, March 31, included the district convenor. The president, Mrs. Milton Brown, was in the chair and minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. C. Service.

The Women's Institutes in Halton have donated \$530 for a gift to the new Home for the Aged in Milton. Nothing definite has been decided upon yet but when the Home is finished, there will be a gift suitably marked, ready for the opening.

The roll call of this meeting was for suggestions to streamline the district annual meeting. Many and varied were the ideas and thoughts, all of which will receive consideration. A resolution to be taken to this meeting in June will be that the word "Dominion" not be deleted from Dominion of Canada. There is also to be a contest, "the best planned program of the year." The programs sent in from each Institute in Halton are to be judged and the awards are to be made at the District Annual and the two best to be sent to the Area Convention.

There is also to be a Salada Tea quilt competition; quilts entered are to be displayed at the District Annual, the winners to be sent to the Area Convention and the best from that to go to the Provincial Convention.

Delegates chosen for the officers' conference to be held in Guelph were Mrs. J. Ellenby and Mrs. W. Watkins.

Letters were read from the Halton Junior Farmers and Ruth Brown, thanking the members of the district for sponsoring their week's trip, also a letter from Mrs. Ruth Clarke, home economist for the district, thanking the ladies for her wedding present.

Plans were made for the district home economic and craft services for the different Institutes, and it is hoped to hold a picnic in Lowville Park in August; definite plans for which will be arranged later.

Mrs. R. G. Purcell, president of the F.W.I.O. wrote that the women of Northern Greece have grateful cause to remember Canada and the Women's Institutes. A new project was recently undertaken to provide food and a tractor for the people of northern Greece; a sum of nearly \$7,000. was raised for this purpose.

Mrs. Alfred Watt was untiring in her efforts to spread the Women's Institute movement in England. There is a plan to erect a cairn and bird bath in the F.W.I.C. plot of the International Peace Garden to commemorate Mrs. Watt's devotion to the organization.
