ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON  
PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

Upstairs in the building that is now occupied by Hotchen's Bakery, when it was located at the present site of the post office was Matthew's Hall. Here the meetings of the council were held until the town hall was built. The Free Press also shared in the history of the building.

The paper was founded there on Dominion Day, 1875, by the late J. H. Hacking, formerly of the Guelph Daily Advertiser. The Rev. T. Albert Moore, D.D., was the first apprentice. John Kenney joined the staff but there was too much night-work for him. He recalls that the paper was not so dry then as it is now. The foreman Bob Simpson, on principle, declared it was impossible to get out the weekly edition without a pitcher of Bob Dickie's Beer.
