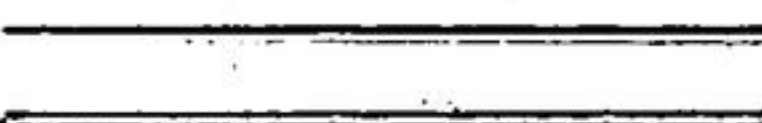

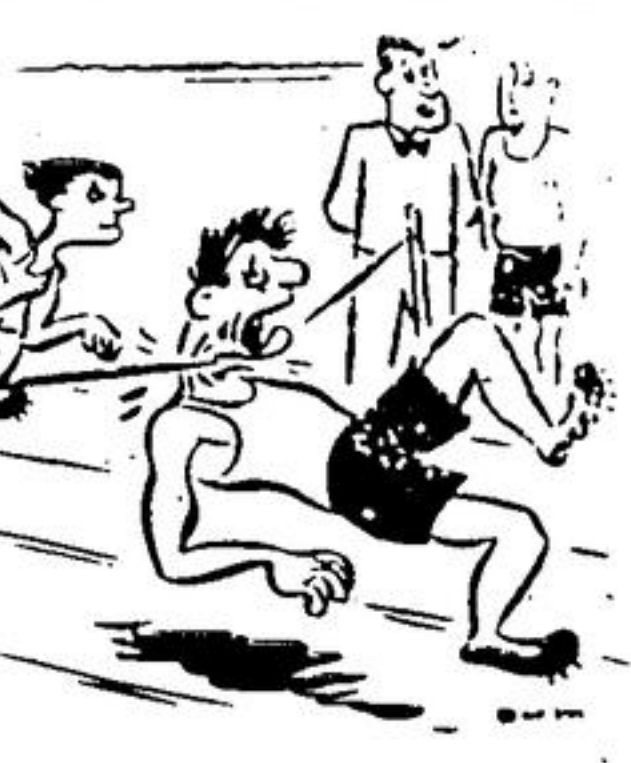

He declared: "I am a native of Halton county; in fact, I was born between two rows of corn." Immediately a well-known Irishman heekled, "A punkin head, he jappers." D. B. lost the crowd, and eventually lost the election.
