REPORT PUMP MOTOR RETURN, OUTLINE WATER HEATER RULE

Superintendent Lambert reported to the Public Utilities Commission at a meeting Monday evening that the motor for the waterworks pump had been returned from Guelph and would be installed in the new well. It is expected that this will be ready to put into operation shortly.

A trolley for moving the pump at the new well has been purchased. Earl Van Norman and Roy Butler were present at this meeting. The Commission outlined the ruling about flat rate water heaters on the Acton system. (An advertisement appears in this issue outlining the details of the plan.) The dealers who purchase tanks from the Commission are to service these tanks and the Commission will replace defective material up to a period of one year from purchase date. The tanks can also be secured from the Commission by the consumer.

J. Morgan, Guelph operating district, was in town this week and inspected the poles which the H.E.P.C. and the Acton P.U.C. use jointly. He promised to replace a pole on Highway 1 at the waterworks entrance to town which would enable the Commission to install a street light there.

A report was received from Halton County Health Unit stating that the town water was again in a classification.

A request from H. Dron to have his water and sewerage charge separately invoiced was presented to the Commission. The symbol has recently been changed on the billing machine and "W.S." now stands for water and sewerage.

A complaint had been verbally received from Mrs. Geo. Benton on being charged the gross amount of their account, which had not been paid until April 22. Commission pointed out that the bill was due when rendered and the last discount day is the 20th. When this day falls on Sunday, it is customary to give until the 21st of the month. A letter is to be sent to this effect over the signature of the chairman.

Mrs. Audrey Urquhart and A. Duly, as employees, were to be put on the pension plan, which is carried by the Commission and employees jointly.

Consolidated Pump and Machinery Co. acknowledged receipt of an order for a pump drive shaft. A bill for \$7.50, the yearly service charge for the cheque writer, was passed for payment.
