"Hello Homemakers! Mothers are often heard to say, please don't buy anything for me on Mother's Day. On the other hand both husbands and children wish they could buy Mom the best she ever wanted. Among the many gifts there are personal items which will be most mindful of her thoughtfulness and care of us. At the same time we should promise to follow the fifth commandment throughout the year. At this time the government announced that the day for public expression of reverence to mothers and the exaltation was adopted as the floral emblem signifying sweetness, purity and endurance. No matter what the gift or gesture may be, let us be sincere about our affection for mother and love.

**TAKE A TIP**

1. If teenagers want to make a cake for next Sunday, suggest an easy recipe for them to follow, and find the icing decorator for them.

2. If the teenager has suggested cooking the Sunday dinner order foods which can be prepared easily and baked at the same time in the oven. One suggestion may be pork chops cooked in mushroom soup, baked potatoes buttered corn niblets and pineapple upside down cake.

**Supper Salad**  
 1 cup head lettuce  
 1 cup green lima beans  
 1 cup grated carrot  
 1/2 cup chopped celery  
 4 minced green onions  
 4 or 5 sprigs watercress  
 1 tbsp. grated old cheese  
 Cut head lettuce in inch size cubes. Drain canned green lima beans and save juice for soup or gravy. Toss lettuce, lima beans, carrot, celery, green onions, watercress and cheese. Whisk a white of an egg and mix over the ingredients. Chill. Before serving sprinkle with French dressing among the foods. Add a tiny salad with an assortment of cold, sliced meats.

**Fruit Gelatine**  
 1 pkg. lime jelly  
 2 bananas  
 1 pkg. cherry jelly  
 1 tin peaches  
 1/2 cup whipping cream  
 Prepare lime jelly according to directions on package and pour into slightly oiled mold. When partially set place sliced bananas around the sides. Place in refrigerator until firm. Meanwhile, make the cherry jelly and then pour gently over lime. When second mixture is partially set, slice the peaches and place along the sides of cherry mixture. (Do not press the fruit directly on the sides of pan.) Chill until firm. Invert the jelly onto a plate. Serve with whipped cream sweetened with 1/2 tsp. sugar.

**Butterscotch Brownies**  
 1/2 cup butter  
 1 cup brown sugar  
 1 egg  
 1 cup vanilla  
 1/2 cup bread flour  
 1 tsp. baking powder  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 cup chopped nuts  
 Melt butter by stovetop and stir in brown sugar until dissolved. Cool ingredients slightly then beat in egg and vanilla. Sift and measure flour; resist with baking powder and salt. Stir dry ingredients into the paste and add the nuts. Pour into a greased 8 x 8 inch pan. Bake in oven of 350 degrees for about 20 minutes. When cool cut into bars.

**SUPER HITCHHIKE**

**THE QUESTION BOX**

Mrs. W. S. asks: Can we cook jars of pineapple in a pressure saucepan?  
 Answer: Cubes of pineapple should be preheated in a medium syrup for 15 minutes before bottling in pint jars. Leave an inch of air space. Then pressure cook for 15 minutes.

Mrs. M. J. asks: Do you add sugar to rhubarb when it is being packaged for frozen locker space?  
 Answer: We do not add sugar as a rule since it is often combined with sweet pineapple for use. Tender rhubarb stalks are cut into inch lengths and frozen "as is".

**Luxurious Lawn In Six Lessons**

The sight of householders out in their gardens this week prompts repetition of six rules for a luxurious green lawn.

One: Spade—dig down 6 to 8 inches and turn the soil over. Break up the large clods and work in black dirt and peat moss as required. The ideal soil is a mixture of sand, organic material and clay.

Two: Rake—cultivate soil into fine texture. Take out stones and foreign material. Mix a good grade of fertilizer into the top 6 inches of the soil. Use about 40 lbs. of fertilizer per 1000 square feet.

Three: Seed — in either early Spring or Fall, sow 5 lbs. of good quality grass seed per 1000 square feet of new lawn. For reseeding old lawns, use 1/2 this amount. Cover seed by raking 1/2 to 3/4 inches of soil over it. For best results, divide seed and plant the first half lengthwise then cover same area walking crosswise. Rolling lightly helps make soil compact.

Four: Water — immediately after planting, water area lightly with fine spray. Repeat daily until grass sprouts. On established lawns, water thoroughly so that water penetrates to a depth of 4 or 5 inches. Don't sprinkle lightly and often. Wet thoroughly once or twice a week.

Five: Fertilize — after lawn is established, apply 30 to 40 lbs. of fertilizer per 1000 square feet. Spread fertilizer evenly, preferably just before a rain. Otherwise, water thoroughly to prevent burning.

Six: Mow — wait until your lawn is 3 or 4 inches high and ground is firm before cutting. Don't clip shorter than 1/2 to 2 inches.
