Trap-Nest First Step In Breeding

Perhaps the most important tool of the poultry raiser is the trap-nest. Invented and used in the nineteenth century it provided the first step in the scientific approach to poultry breeding. To-day, chickens are very efficient producers of eggs and meat compared with those of even 20 years ago, and much of the improvement has resulted from the application of sound breeding practices.

In contrast, the domestic goose has long been overlooked by the poultry investigators, and consequently little improvement has been made in the goose's characteristics. In recent years, there has been a revival of interest in goose production, says E. S. Merritt, of Central Experimental Farm Poultry Division, and the Division has undertaken a more concentrated program of the study and improvement of the domestic goose than in the past.

The trap-nest, although considered a soundly established tool by poultry investigators and breeders, has never been used to any great extent with geese. Investigators at the University of Minnesota found in 1950 that domestic geese could be trap-nested successfully. Accordingly, a preliminary investigation of the feasibility of the trap-nest was made at the Central Experimental Farm in 1951 with encouraging results. About forty-five females were trap-nested in specially designed nests.

The geese were handled with care and allowed to become familiar with the nests before the breeding season. Less than 5 per cent of the eggs laid were clashed as floor eggs, that is, eggs laid outside the nests. With an enlarged project during 1952, it is thought that much valuable information will be obtained to serve as background for recommendations on the breeding of geese.

Thus the goose breeder will be able to arrange his breeding program on a sound economic and genetic basis. Study of the goose has long been neglected and the project of the Central Experimental Farm should help to bring it up to date.

OIL BURNER FLOODED, LIT; BLAZE CONTROLLED BY FIREMEN
