Mrs. W. A. Weaver, of Burlington, was elected President of the Halton County Children's Aid Society at the annual meeting held at St. Paul's United Church, Milton, on the evening of May 7th.

In his interesting report, Mr. Thompson said he was very happy to report they had been very few cases of neglect in a child, but while many other problems had come to his attention, they were chiefly moral ones which could be blamed partially on the high cost of living.

Year after year the problem families appear to follow the same general pattern. A similarity exists in the type of neglect, such as quarrelling, immorality, excessive drinking and in all too many cases, the separation of parents.

Referring to problems within the home, Clare Vinnels, director of the Hamilton Children's Aid Society, who was introduced by Charles I. Kirkness, Acton, declared, "We want to reach these children in their own homes before it reaches the stage where they have to be removed from them."

"We are also endeavoring to put more emphasis on our own work, especially toward the neglected

child in his home," he added, describing in a very interesting manner the work that has been accomplished through difficult times experienced by some families. He also emphasized the success experienced by the Society in connection with foster homes. "Establishment of these foster homes has been very gratifying, especially in the environment of a child over placing a child in a shelter."

Mrs. M. J. Brown thanked the speaker for his interesting address. Warden J. M. Wickson expressed his appreciation for the work accomplished by the Halton branch and commended the personnel. He also suggested the population of the county would be doubled within a short time, thus increasing the work of the entire group.

Several musical numbers were sung by the male quartette of Knox Presbyterian Church, and two delightful solos were sung by Mrs. Murray Hall of Burlington, President E. D. Mahon was in the chair.
