Foot, Mouth Fears In Erin Groundless

as the cause of the sudden death of Wolf Cubs of the Halifax School at least eight cattle in Erin township last week, following tests at the Ontario Veterinary College. Two Drinks Impair **Driving Test Shows**

A series of road tests conducted with 37 skilled drivers, aged 20 to 45, proved that the amount of whiskey in two highballs "caused a deterioration of 25 to 30 per cent in the driving performance of expert drivers."

Dr. Leonard Goldberg, of the Carline Institute of Sweden, conducted the tests to prove or disprove the claim of many motorists that they "can drive better after two or three drinks."

More startling evidence comes, the article says, from Motorforarna, a Swedish Insurance Co. writing "traffic insurance" solely for nondrinking motorists. Motorforarna has been in business 18 years, now has over 7.000 policyholders. Its record over 14 years compared with other Swedish companies indicated that Motorforarna had to pay in losses per vehicle 38 per cent, less than the average of the other companies. The number of claims per 100 vehicles was 37 per cent. less. Since by no means all the policyholders in these other companies were drinking drivers, alcohol played a tremendous difference in creating the difference between the two groups.
