Calf For a Quarter At Sale of 1864

Think things are bad? Things almost always were, according to critics of any period in our history, and maybe always will be, according to any age's contemporaries.
Things were bad in 1864, too, judging by an old clipping belonging to John McClure of Acton.

The article is from a paper published in Perth County, November 1864.

"We regret to see so many bailiffs' sales as there are this year. The other day some unfortunate from Logan had all his stock sold at one of the sales which took place in front of the Commercial Hotel, Mitchell.

Notwithstanding that there were about 80 people present, horses worth from \$30 to \$50 sold at from \$8 to \$12, and good milking cows at from \$6.25 to \$9. We heard of another sale in Logan on Wednesday last, where two spring calves were sold for 26 cents."
