Bill Still Unpaid After Hot Debate

"Have I implied fraud?" "You have implied there has been fraud in this contract," the engineer said.

"There have been protests all along on councillors receiving business from the town," Mayor Rachlin declared, also denying a charge of fraud.

"I contend you started those protests last year. You've created a future ever since you got on council," Councillor Taylor charged.

I. MacSwain suggested that Councillor Thompson had every right to vote and hoped he would do so.

The controversial question was delayed and a committee of Mayor Rachlin, Reeve Hargrave, Deputy Reeve Stewart, Councillor Taylor and Solicitor Leatherland was appointed to interview a representative of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

Council by resolution instructed the solicitor to negotiate settlement of Spartan claim if possible by paying \$10,000 now and retaining the balance pending further settlement or determination by the court. They authorized issuance of a check for the amount on the request of the solicitor.

Sewer accounts amounting to \$1,435.13 were passed for payment. **Illnesses Lacrosse** R. Goodwin of the Lacrosse Club asked if council would be willing to accept their percentage on the gate receipts based on 600 admissions since programs were used and no actual count was available. This was approved.

Council also approved payment for materials to be repaired in the arena, not exceeding \$10. Further repairs were to be approved by the park committee. Use of the amplifying system by the club was approved, provided it was returned in the same condition.

Payment of \$25 to the firm for washing the streets on Saturday morning was approved. There was some question of the legality of using fire equipment for purposes other than fire protection and this was to be investigated since it was planned to use the old truck for pumping sewers.

Council approved payment of indigent patient accounts totalling \$201.50.

**Rebate of \$720** Clerk McGeachie reported on some correspondence with the Department of Highways on a connecting link agreement. Payment of the town share of upkeep had been made of some \$720. There was some question of the legality of using fire equipment for purposes other than fire protection and this was to be investigated since it was planned to use the old truck for pumping sewers.

Notification of the equalized assessment by-law passed by the county was received and accepted. G. Wallace asked that council make their usual grant to the Acton Fair Board. The grant of \$200 as allowed in the estimates was made.

A discussion on the Rural Fire Area was terminated and left in the hands of the Acton representatives.

The rental of \$20 was voted to the Acton Y's Men's Club for the arena.

A feece was to be erected along the dump property in accordance with the purchase agreement.

W. Coleman Jr. submitted a bill for \$2 for cutting weeds on his boulevard on Bowser Ave with the notation "pay this or see to it someone cuts them in future." The letter was ordered filed.

H. K. Dodds applied for the trapping line rights on the marshes and banks of Fairy Lake, which could be granted under a new law. Council did not feel these rights should be limited but planned to investigate the new law.
