Hello Homemakers! There's magic with cream. Don't you feel like a magician when chilled cream begins to puff, billowy-like around the beaters? Then, too, there is great delight in everyone's expression whenever they are served dessert topped with plain whipped cream. Have you ever varied the taste of whipped cream? You can flavor it sparingly with a drop of extract or fruit juice, sweeten with white or brown sugar, or sprinkle sparingly with nutmeg, silvered candy-tanger or minced maraschino cherries.

TAKE A TIP

- 1. Whipping cream is often used without whipping in ways similar to those for light cream. 2. Among the favorite desserts topped with whipped cream are fruit shortcake, warm gingerbread, sweet gelatines, custard and cream-type pies, plain cakes, and chilled, cooked fruit. 3. The family will always enjoy whipped cream mixed with salad dressing (1 c. cream to 1/2 c. of dressing) on fruit salads. 4. Sour cream can also be beaten and used for vegetable salads. Beat 2 sieved cooked egg yolks with 1 cup sour cream, 1 tsp. lemon juice and 1/2 tsp. salt for vegetable or fish salads. 5. Variations of flavorings for sour cream are cardamom seed, horseradish or chopped chives. 6. To whip cream: (a) The colder the cream, the faster it whips. (b) A deep, narrow-sided bowl topped with whipped cream and fruit shortcake, warm gingerbread, sweet gelatines, custard and cream-type pies, plain cakes, and chilled, cooked fruit. (c) Cream that is 24 to 72 hours old is whipped easily. (d) Add 1/2 tsp. of gelatin before cream is beaten if it has to stand for more than an hour before serving. (e) Fold in sugar after beating, else the volume will be smaller than usual. 7. Keep whipped cream cold after beating. 8. Larder whipped cream may be frozen in a cup and kept in the freezing unit for a week. Date Parfait: 1/2 cup chopped pitted dates, 1 1/2 cups water, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 egg yolks, well beaten, 1 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped. Cook dates in water 20 minutes, add sugar and salt and cook 10 minutes longer. Pour slowly over egg yolks. Cook over boiling water until thickened, stirring constantly. Chill and add orange juice and whipped cream. Freeze in refrigerator until firm. Makes 1 quart.

Heart Cake

- 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cups sugar, 2 eggs, separated, 1 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract, 1/4 cup tart red jelly, 1 cup heavy cream, whipped. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with 1/4 cups of the sugar until fluffy. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Beat egg whites until nearly stiff, add remaining sugar and beat until stiff; then fold into cake with flavoring. Turn into 2 greased (3-inch) pans and bake in oven of 350 degrees, 30 minutes. When cooled, melt jelly over warm water and spread between layers and over top and sides of cake. Chill until set. Just before serving, pipe whipped cream in heart shape on top and serve with more whipped cream. Serves 10.

Butter Pecan Ice Cream

- 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup broken pecan meat, 1 1/3 cups milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 eggs, separated, 1 cup heavy cream, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Dissolve sugar and salt in milk. Brown pecans in butter, cool. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Whip cream until thick enough to hold a soft peak; add vanilla and fold in egg yolks, egg whites, milk and pecans. Pour into freezing tray of refrigerator and freeze, stirring every 30 minutes until the mixture will hold its shape, then freeze until firm. Serves 6.

Fig Nut Whip

- 1 cup dried figs, 1 1/2 cups hot water, 1 package lemon gelatin, 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats. Rinse figs; boil in water to cover for 30 minutes. Drain, clip stems and cut into small pieces. Pour hot water over gelatin and stir until dissolved; cool. When gelatin begins to thicken, add whipped cream and nuts and mix thoroughly. Pour into serving dishes, chill until firm and garnish with whipped cream and pecans or fruit. Serves 6.

B-HIVES CRUSH MOHAWKS 19-6 IN AUSPICIOUS LACROSSE DEBUT

Giving the Indians a lesson in their own game, Acton B-Hives stung Brant-Norfolk Mohawks 19-6 in their lacrosse debut here on Saturday night to the delight of the 300 odd spectators, most of whom had never seen a lacrosse game before. The Mohawks managed to keep up the fast pace set by the Acton club in the first two periods but wilted badly in the final two and the B-Hives swarmed all over them. Anticipating an easy victory, the Mohawks brought only two substitutes with them and by game's end were an exhausted lot. The B-Hives broke through their defence in lightning sorties that had them reeling and with no one to spell them off, the Indians made only a lone attempt at defence. Earlier in the week, the Indians toppled Burlington by a 9-6 count and this may have led them to draw conclusions about Acton. Anyway, it was an easy win for the red and gold liveried B-Hives and a good one to take in front of a large home crowd. Uncomfortable hot weather didn't diminish the spectators nor daunt the B-Hives from giving the fans a favourable impression in what must be one of the roughest, toughest sports active today.

Next Saturday night the B-Hives take on the Okanogan-Caledonia Six Nation Indians in Acton, journeying to Simcoe to meet the Mohawks tonight (Thursday). The Six Nation Indians have a penchant for stealing the home team's thunder that has stood them in good stead in previous years. They usually have a big war party with them as practically both villages, Okanogan and Caledonia, are infested with rabid lacrosse fans. Saturday, if last week was any criterion, the Six Nations should be reduced to one or two.

"Creepy" Alfalfa To Spook Pastures

A new alfalfa variety with a true creeping-root system has been developed at the Swift Current Station in collaboration with the Dominion Forage Crops Laboratory at Saskatoon. The plant is drought-resistant and judging from preliminary tests, promises to be hardy enough to maintain itself on western pastures, even if heavily grazed. The creeping-root alfalfa will be seeded next spring on 15 agricultural stations in western Canada, including stations in the Yukon and North-West Territories. The object is to establish mixed permanent pastures of alfalfa and crested wheat grass or brome grass that will persist under severe grazing, dry weather, and severe winter conditions. This development will introduce the first perennial forage legume to meet the stringent requirements of the drier prairie areas, provided of course the plant lives up to the high expectations held by scientists who are most enthusiastic over its unique creeping-root system and preliminary performance.

PRICE OF LIBERTY
