AUTO - biographies

ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

In 1876 the members of the Congregational Church in Acton decided that it was too inconvenient to go'up to the old church at Churchill for service, and that it would be advantageous to have a hew church in the growing village, the Methodists having erected a new church the year before.

Mr. Ryder was the moving spirit in the enterprise. He was a member of the Building Committee and Treasurer of the Beard. The church was built and the opening took place in 1877, with Dr. Ives as the preacher of the day.

The congregation worshipped here for only a few years. The cost of erection seriously embarrassed the Finance Committee and the mortgage held by Dr. McCullough, Georgetowh, was finally foreclosed. Later the Lord's Army and the Salvation Army used it but it was finally purchased by St. Joseph's parish from the Mc-Cultough estate.
