**BUZZING B-HIVES IN HIGH GEAR SETTING PACE IN LACROSSE CIRCUIT**

Acton B-Hives are setting a fast pace for the other teams in the Intermediate lacrosse circuit. They won their fourth straight game without a defeat Tuesday night by bouncing Burlington 5-3 in what was easily the closest game of the season to date.

Saturday night in front of a large home crowd, the B-Hives swamped the Oshawken-Caledonia Iroquois 11-3 in a fast game that had the crowd on the edge of its seats through most of the first two periods. And last Thursday in Simcoe the B-Hives scored another easy win over Brant-Norfolk Mohawks in a rough contest by a 11-5 score.

Tonight, they meet Streetsville in that town and play host to Dundas on Saturday night here. Dundas is considered the team to beat in the southern section of the league, excepting Acton, of course.

**Burlington Improving**

Beating Burlington Tuesday night in hot, humid weather was no easy task. Although the Burlington club has yet to hit the win column, they have the B-Hives, the stiffest opposition they have encountered this season. The score was tied at half-time 4-4 and the home club was pressing.

Burlington took the lead early in the third quarter but the B-Hives pulled-as Tom-Howell potted-two goals and Doug Townsend and John Haines tallied singles to pack the game away.

Norm Young was outstanding in the nets and he took up the slack when the Acton club had defensive lapses. On the assault Tom Howell, Ted Howell and Doug Townsend sent two goals apiece to pace the B-Hives. Johnny Haines and Walt Alexander picked up singletons.

For Burlington W. Lewis scored twice to lead the attack.

In the event the O.L.A. decides to grant Streetsville both players, the B-Hives hope to get some help from Fergus. Two or three players from Fergus have already approached the Acton executive about landing a spot on the club.

ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

In 1878 the members of the Congregational Church in Acton decided that it was too inconvenient to go up to the old church at Churchhill for service, and that it would be advantageous to have a new church in the growing village, the Methodists having erected a new church the year before.

Mr. Ryder was the moving spirit in the enterprise. He was a member of the Building Committee and Treasurer of the Board. The church was built and the opening took place in 1877, with Dr. Ives as the preacher of the day.

The congregation worshipped here for only a few years. The cost of erection seriously embarrassed the Finance Committee and the mortgage held by Dr. McCullough, Georgetown, was finally foreclosed. Later the Lord's Army and the Salvation Army used it but it was finally purchased by St. Joseph's parish from the McCullough estate.
