FOUR NEW TEACHERS COMPLETE SCHOOL STAFF FOR NEXT TERM

The Acton Public School teaching staff is now complete for the beginning of the September term according to Principal G. W. McKenzie. Four new teachers have been added to the staff. Ralph McKesson will teach in grade five and six, Mrs. L. Little grade three, Miss Shirley Elliott, kindergarten and Miss Jean Kirby kindergarten and half time on the rotary system.

Other teachers in the public school will be Mrs. Algor and Mrs. Gamble, grade one; Miss W. MacKay, grade two; Miss D. Bruth, grades two and three; Miss L. Anderson, grade four; Mrs. Wilkinson, grade five; Miss D. Volter, grade six; E. Smith, grade seven; G. W. McKenzie, grade eight; Frank Elliott, Guelph, will teach music.

Less than four per cent of the 404 students attending school in June of this year, failed according to statistics of the principal. There were 15 failures, 14 recommendations and 375 passes during the year. Perfect attendance was recorded by 20 pupils for the year with a total of days lost in the school at 5714, many of which chicken pox and measles were accountable for. The average days lost per pupil were 14 according to the report.
