Is Beaten At Judo, But Wins At Chess

Trevor Pryce Leggett is the BBC's Japanese Program Organizer. Few people could be better fitted for the post, for he has had long and extensive experience of Japan, speaks the language fluently and is an expert at Judo and Japanese chess. Leggett is a Londoner who was educated at London University, and from the age of seventeen he studied Judo, completing his training in Japan. He has the distinction of having attained "Fifth Dan," the highest grade of Judo held by any non-Japanese and one rank below the present champion, T. Daigo. Leggett recently took on Daigo, the all-Japan Judo champion in an exhibition match at London's Albert Hall. He had frequently met the runner-up in the championship, Yoshimatsu, but this was Leggett's first meeting with Daigo, who proved too good for him, which is not surprising as the Englishman was giving him twelve years. Leggett gained his revenge later on when he beat Daigo soundly at Japanese chess, and after the matches Daigo, R. Kano, President of the Japan Judo Association, and Leggett all broadcast together in the BBC's Japanese Service, a program which was relayed in Japan to stations all over the country.

Leggett was serving with the British Embassy at Tokyo and was interned when war broke out. He was released in a diplomatic exchange in 1943 and 1943 joined the South East Asia Command as a Japanese language expert.

To Canada in 1832 Ancestor Honored

A pleasant event of Saturday, June 21, was a Samuel Tovell Family Reunion held at Stanley Park, Erin. By noon some 120 members of the family had gathered, and others came later in the afternoon. The day was a perfect one for such an occasion, and everything indicated a well planned picnic. Lunch baskets were laden, races and games were enjoyed, but the greatest pleasure came from visiting and more visiting with relatives from as far away as Vermilion, Alberta, Windsor, Detroit, Rochester, New York City and other places.

A brief program followed the lunch when the president, Ernest Tovell of Grand Valley, and the secretary, Mrs. John Alton of Everton, welcomed the family, and thanked the various committees who had worked to make the day a most successful one.

A short biography of the late Samuel Tovell was read by one of his grandsons.

"Samuel Tovell was born in Lowestoft, Suffolk, England, in 1811, the son of Mark and Hannah Oaks Tovell. In 1832 Mark Tovell with his wife and 12 children set sail in the Sailing Vessel "Queen Caroline" for Canada. The voyage was stormy, and several weeks out, they were caught in an ice jam in the Straits of Belle Isle for three weeks. Food and water became very scarce, and they suffered much hardship and privation, but traveled on and finally landed at Hamilton, from there they walked to Guelph through the bush, over brush, fallen trees and stumps, through mosquito infested swamps, and with many wild animals around in the forest. It was no pleasure jaunt as they were carrying all their worldly possessions, and burdened with little children unused to the wilds of Canada.

"This was just the beginning of their hardships in making homes for each of them. In July 1832 they reached Guelph—then just a few houses in the wilderness. Here they settled for a time.

"In 1841 Samuel married Eliza Darby, and in 1842 they moved to Lot 16, Concession 6, Ermosa, Johnathan settled on the adjoining farm. There the men hewed out homes for themselves and families.

In 1852 Eliza Tovell died, leaving one daughter and six sons—Mary Ann, Johnathan, Robert, David, William, Kenneth and Horace. In 1853 Grandfather was married to Janet Butchart, who died in 1881 leaving three sons and four daughters—Agnes, Edmund, Catharine, Charles, Amos, Minnie and Ellen. Grandfather continued to live there until his death in March, 1897, at the age of 82 years and 3 months.

"During Grandfather's 45 years on that farm near Everton, he had seen great changes—from a virgin forest peopled by wandering Indians to one of fruitful farm land, well populated living in comfortable homes with churches, schools and good roads. The mode of travel had also changed from walking to oxen and then horses. He no longer had to take his grist to Hamilton to mill with oxen and sled, nor had their clothing to be spun at home, as grist and woolen mills had been built nearer.

"Grandfather was a big man, 6'4", and weighed around 200 lbs.—big in kindness, in neighborliness, in the example he set for his family in Christian living and in favor with God and man."

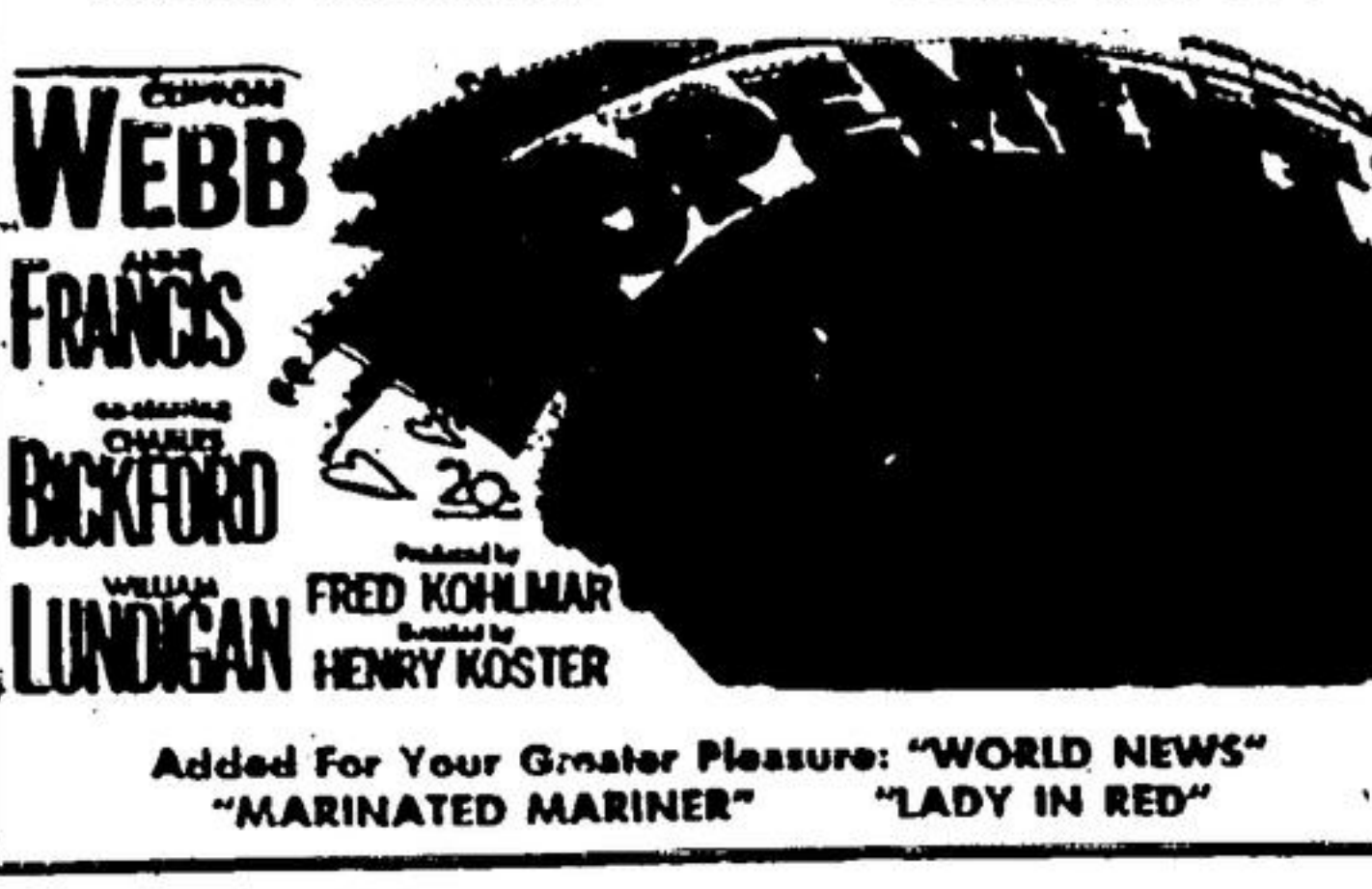
