IMPERIAL OIL'S \$11,000,000 PIPE CUTS HALTON SOUTH OF MILTON

Workers from many parts of the world are snaking a hollow ribbon of steel from Sarnia to Toronto, crossing Highway 25 about five miles south of Milton this week. The 200 mile pipe line is being built by Imperial Oil to transport oil products from Sarnia on the west to Toronto at an expected cost of \$11,000,000 and goes from Sarnia to Toronto via London and Waterloo down with a spur line from Waterloo to Hamilton. The line is being laid at an average of two miles a day with the entire working gang spread over a five mile strip in various stages of construction. The project is expected to be completed by the fall of this year.

Purpose of the pipe line is to expand facilities for Imperial Oil Products. The company had the alternative of building new ships and extensive tankage to hold products in the months when navigation on the Great Lakes is closed or of construction of a products pipe line.

Officials explained the pipe line was chosen for two reasons. Securely bedded down, three feet below the surface of the ground, it will not be affected by winter weather and its operations can be flexible, continuing through the year, day in and day out, summer and winter. In addition the line will require less steel than a ship-and-tankage program. Most of the pipe used is being made in Great Britain and shipped via Montreal.

Wherever the line is to approach urban areas, it is routed outside the built-up districts to avoid running through sections where sewers, water and gas mains would present difficult engineering problems.

In the path of the line 800 properties will be crossed, with 31 water crossings, 16 provincial highways crossed and eight counties, including of course Halton.

In most cases the company paid cash for a 50 foot right-of-way

through property for construction and maintenance of the line. Title still rests with the owner and after construction, farmers will have full use of the land except that they may not drill or excavate near the pipe nor may they build permanent structures on the right-of-way.

One farmer was quite eager to have the line run through his property. The cause of his eagerness soon became apparent. Part of his price was his own personal one-inch line to be hooked into the products line to provide a direct and free, supply route to his home. The pipe line was routed around, instead of through, his land.

Present plans call for the line to be served by one pumping station to be located at Sarnia. The station will eventually be equipped with pumps driven by three 500 horsepower electrical motors.

It is expected the completed line will begin operations at about 22,000 barrels a day. A barrel is 35 Imperial gallons. Products are put into the line in "batches". The different product batches are fed in one after another and travel through the line much like containers pushing one another along. On a 22,000 barrel-a-day schedule the products would travel at a fast moving speed, about four miles an hour.

A village of about 22 trailers follows the pipe-line. Valued at about \$5,000 each the trailers house families of construction workers from Alaska, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and many other places, who have worked in many parts of the world where pipe-lines are more common.

Women and children follow the construction men. The trailer village is home to the 22 families, with washing on the line, television aerials up and everybody taking part in community activities once the trailers are halted for their week-long stay in one place. Some of the families have been on the move with this village for thousands of miles from coast to coast.

The pipe line workers work a 16 hour day, seven days a week, making as high as \$250 for the week. They clean, prime and wrap the pipe against weather before it is lowered.

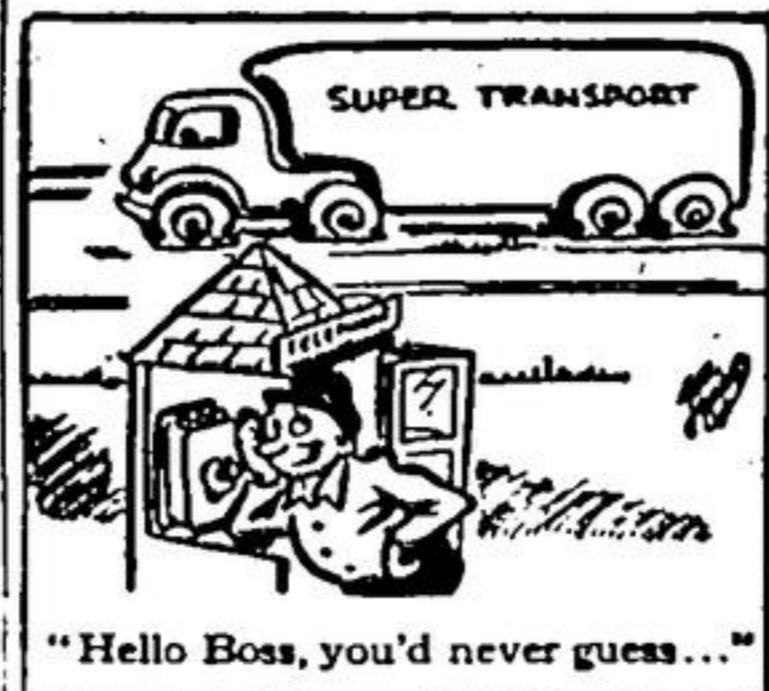

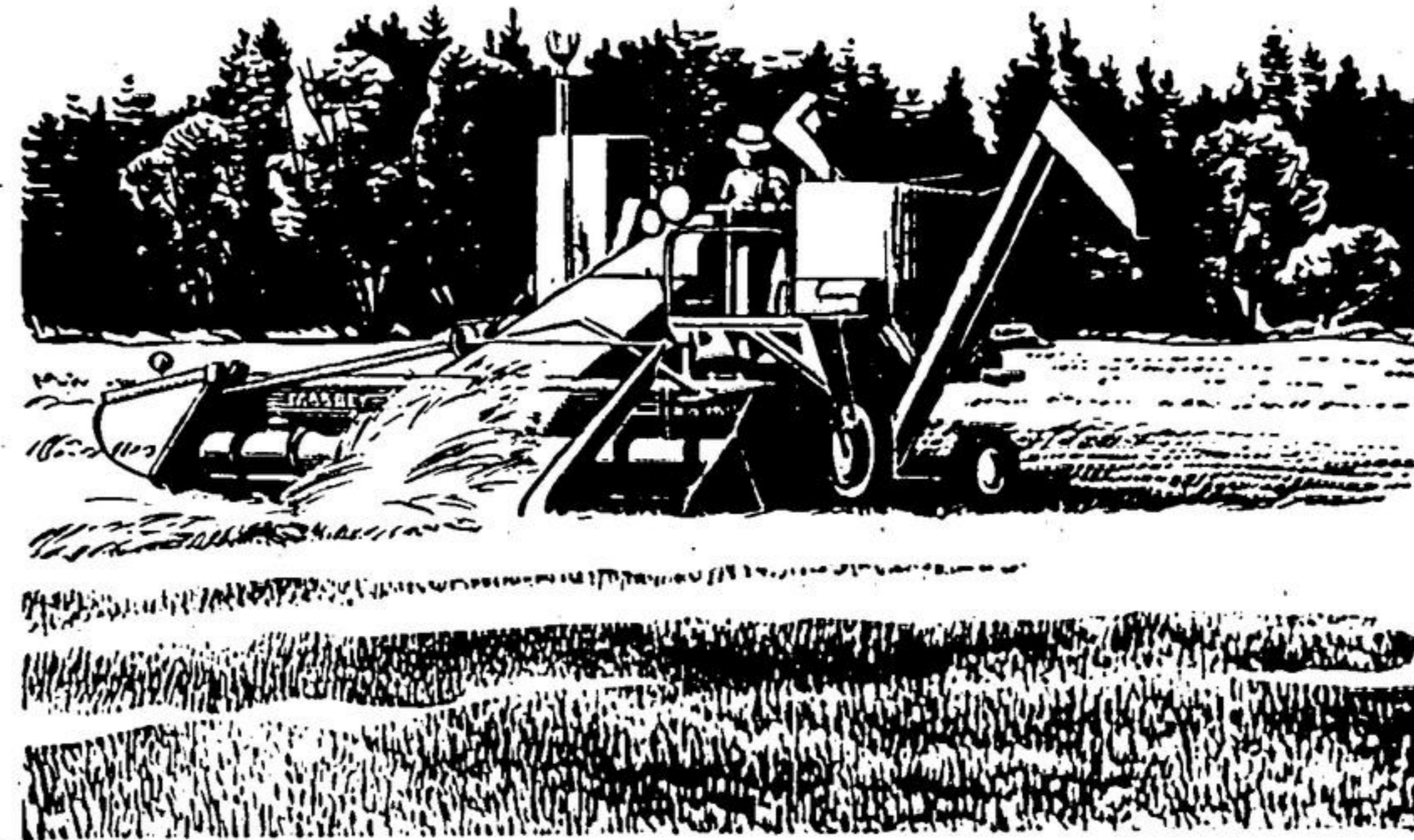
