ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

What a place that old station was. A little low frame building, severely rectangular in its outline, painted a dirty drab, about one in every score of years and smoke-colored and dirty inside and out between times. What a place it was.

There were living quarters at the west end of very limited accommodation for the agent and his family; a seven-by-nine room about big enough for a couple of good sized Saratoga trunks and a pair of old-fashioned carpet bags, and access to it only through the passenger waiting room. The agent's office, ticket room and operators' quarters had a room about 10 by 12, and behind this was the lamp oil room.

The first agent recalled was Johnnie Ahern. He retired finally and bought the Royal Exchange Hotel, which stood where the telephone office now stands. Johnnie was a good station agent, but not a marked success as a landlord, for Johnnie had too many friends who patronized the bar.
