Tomato Dressing
2 slices bread
1 clove garlic
1 can tomato paste
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. sugar
1/4 tsp. paprika
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 cup salad oil
1/4 cup cider vinegar

Green Goddess Dressing
1 cup mayonnaise
1 clove garlic, minced
1/4 cup onion tops, minced
1/4 cup parsley, minced
1 tsp. lemon juice
1 tsp. tarragon vinegar
1/2 tsp. salt
3 anchovies, chopped
Few grains pepper

Chili Dressing
1/2 green pepper
1 dill pickle
1/4 onion
12 stuffed olives
2 tbsp. capers
Dash of tabasco sauce
1/4 cups mayonnaise
1/4 cup chili sauce
1 tsp. minced parsley
Salt to taste

Grind together the green pepper, dill pickle, olives, onion and capers. Then add remaining ingredients and chill well. Stir before serving.

**Father of Six
Passes Suddenly**

Tullamore district was shocked by the sudden passing on Friday, August 1 of Richard Henry Turner at his home there, aged sixty-two years.

**C.N.E. Hospital
For Sick Animals**

Two new services being added this year by the Agriculture Committee of the Canadian National Exhibition are expected to be of immense value to the exhibitors of poultry, pigeons and pet stock. For the first time complete veterinary supervision will be provided by the C.N.E. for all of these classes. Previous exhibits at the exhibition have been remarkably free from diseases and the new service will assist in continuing this good record.

The second new service will be the establishment of a veterinary hospital for the entire exhibition to diagnose and treat any disease or illnesses that may develop among the entries during the C.N.E.

**Revise Estimates
On Atomic Power**

How soon will atomic power in Canada be applied commercially? Warren Baldwin writing in the Financial Post says perhaps in only two years. He writes: "Developments of the last nine months have shortened by perhaps a dozen years the bridge of time between the present and the atomic age. On both sides of the American-Canadian border, estimates are being revised."

He lists the following important moves during the past nine months:—A building in England has been heated by atomic fuel.

—A steam turbine has been turned in United States and produced enough electricity for a lighting system.

—The keel of the first atomic submarine has been laid and the experimental atomic propulsion unit is nearing completion. The project was launched four years ago.

—Five contracts have been concluded between American industry and the United States Government for the development of land-based prototype power plants for submarines and planes.

—In Canada, a new reactor is under construction at Chalk River that will produce substantial quantities of fissile material.

TAKE A TIP

About your refrigerator:
1. Remember the white enamel is acid-resistant, not acid-proof. If you spill milk, fruit juice and such foods, wipe them up as soon as it is convenient for you to do so.

2. Plastic parts should be washed in warm, not hot, soapy water. Rinse in clear lukewarm water and dry thoroughly.

3. Your refrigerator needs defrosting when the frost is about 1/2-inch thick.

4. For defrosting non-automatic models, turn the control to Off or Defrost. Remove contents of Frozen Storage unit, chill tray and meat keeper. Leave container in position to catch the water. Wrap frozen food from the freezer compartment in heavy paper. Place pans of hot water in freezing compartment; empty and refill as required.

5. Do not hurry the removal of ice with a knife or sharp object because the freezer plates may be damaged.

6. Meanwhile wipe off dishes and sort out foods.

7. Wash interior and exterior with mild soapy water. Rinse and wipe dry. Reset the temperature control to normal operating position. Refill ice cube trays with fresh warm water.

8. The exterior of the refrigerator needs an occasional cleaning. If you use a refrigerator cleaning wax it can be cleaned and polished in one operation.

9. The dust from the motor and condenser should be cleaned off once a year. (Use an attachment of the vacuum cleaner or a small broom.) Jockey the refrigerator out of its corner to clean.

10. Remove the evaporator pan of the automatic refrigerator. Wash in mild soap and water, rinse and dry. Twice a year is usually sufficient.

THE QUESTION BOX

Mrs. W. I. asks: What food do you suggest in place of potatoes?
Answer: At the noon meal you should include another vegetable and at the evening meal serve hot buttered rice or macaroni or vice-versa. Remember to serve creamed meat or egg dishes on toasted whole wheat bread or top with crumbs and cheese. In this way there will be added nutrition value since potatoes contain protein, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins A, B-1, B-2 and C.

Mrs. C. D. asks: Can we boil rice or spaghetti in the oven in the same way as we cook carrots or creamed potatoes?
Answer: Cereals such as rice, noodles, macaroni or spaghetti may be oven-steamed along with an oven meal in the oven. The method is to use a large greased casserole in which the measured rice or other cereal is placed. Add hot water to cover and salt. Place a lid to fit on the dish and allow 1 hour steaming.
