ACTON PEOPLE AND - ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

Peter S. Armstrong of Eramosa, one of the trustees when the Congregational Church, now St. Joseph's, was built was Acton's first dairyman who operated a general milk route. He delivered with a push eart, rich milk at five cents per quart, but on week day only. He refused any Sunday delivery except where there were sick babies or old folks who were ill,

The first self-binder brought to this section was demonstrated in Mr. Armstrong's field.

When the first sulky rake, with steel teeth was introduced a Mr. Snyder took the agency. He accosted Thomas Davidson who with his canny Scotch carefulness declined to invest. Mr. Snyder, however, made a proposition that the farmer rake and bind his grain as in the past, giving the seller permission to follow with his rake. For the hay gathered he promised Mr. Davidson a sulky rake. He claimed he got more gleanings than brought the price.
