ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

"Squire" Grant was the common name for Alexander Grant who was a magistrate of the old school and a useful member of the community. In those days when neighbors quarrelled over the back fence about the pranks or misdemeanors of their children or the intrusions of the chickens upon the newly planted garden, they had recourse to the peace making proclivities of Squire Grant, Squire Hall or Squire Brown.

And if none of these pleased their fastidious tastes they had Squire Campbell of T'knowhead Farm, just over the town line of Nassagaweya, to whom to recount their grievances.

Acton was well supplied with Justices of the Peace in her hamlet days. Upon the appointment of W. H. Storey, however, more than 70 years ago, most of the magisterial cases of the community were adjudicated before him. He was always popular as a magistrate and kept well informed of his duties.
